Dear Parents:

Welcome to edition number eight of The Full Curl.

Most of you by now are aware I have assumed the role of Director of Schools here at Monroe. However, many of you may not know about the other half of my responsibilities, which fall under the title of President of the Monroe Foundation. While these jobs are certainly tied together, they are indeed different and both are of vital importance to the school.

One word I have used a lot more this year than in the past is context. I feel like it is very important to share proper context when talking about the Monroe Foundation and what it does. In a perfect world, the Monroe Foundation is responsible for raising roughly \$1.3 million to help support tuition grants for families who need financial help to send their children to the Catholic Schools. I say in a perfect world, because over the years, monies raised by the Foundation have also offset operational costs. I suspect this will continue to be the case until we are able to make a greater expansion in enrollment (which we are absolutely going to do).

While I am the President of the Monroe Foundation, Patty Walter heads up our fundraising strategies and organizes the multitude of fundraisers responsible for raising monies vital to our school. The

office also includes Andrea McGill, who helps in a variety of roles related to HIPOW and other areas of the Foundation. Lynne Puryear has been a rock, handling every possible aspect of managing the business office. You will also find Lisa Sundborg working in the business office, along with Renee Loustalot. All of these ladies are integral to the overall success of the Foundation.

Recently I was having a discussion with a parent considering Monroe. She asked if we had scholarships. While she readily admitted that her family would likely not qualify for financial support, she was curious because she knows other families who may be interested who very well might need help. I had seen this parent at HIPOW and took the opportunity to mention the Foundation and how HIPOW plays a significant role in helping us raise money, which is in turn used to provide grants to support families who need tuition assistance. What she told me next bothered me immensely. She said she had been to a few HIPOWs and had always thought the occasion was simply a bunch of wealthy people getting together to help wealthy kids. I was taken aback.

At CSF it costs us roughly \$12,500 a year to educate a child (full tuition). While I know this is a lot of money, it is far less than the roughly \$22K the public schools are getting from the state to fund the education of one child. I can tell you we have more Monroe parents paying full tuition than ever before. Even so, we have to raise a lot more money than what HIPOW brings us in order to support all 337 students attending our schools.

While everyone knows about HIPOW, there are a number of lesser-known fundraisers we deploy over the course of the year. You may remember the summer concluding with a giant garage sale held in our multi-purpose room and commons. Yep, that was a Foundation fundraiser. In the near future, you will hear of us selling St Patrick's Day Raffle tickets, another huge Foundation fundraiser. Additionally, about five years ago we started having a Spring Fundraiser to help keep the doors to the school open. All of these events help us provide financial support to families who need it to cover some portion of tuition costs.

The purpose of discussing this topic with each of you is not so much to educate you, but to help you educate other people who may be interested in our schools. The words "private school" trigger immediate stereotypes, one of which is of a school populated only by wealthy kids, who might also be arrogant and snobby." I've been here for sixteen years now and I know very well that stereotype is far from accurate. We have a school full of children, many from households whose means are far less than affluent. In my position as a morning greeter at the front door, I've welcomed kids whose family's vehicle hood is held down by a bungee cord. And yes, I've also greeted kids in the morning whose families have been blessed financially. However, from the first day I arrived, I have been blown away by the generosity of those who have the means to make a difference.

I'm hoping you can help us with the continued education of the public, which can impact our school positively in two very distinct ways. First, we need to let more families know the dream of an extraordinary, faith-based education is viable. To be clear, there will be no free education. Everyone will be required to make some sacrifice if they wish to be educated in these schools and be a part of this remarkable community. Still, we need parents to know we have the ability to provide financial support through the Foundation. Parents also need to continue to be made aware of the BEST program and money that is available to them through BEST and other programs like it.

Secondly, by letting people know what we do in the Foundation, we may find donors who are willing to support the Foundation at an even greater level. In addition to the fundraisers we currently run, I am actively seeking donors who would love to impact the life of a student by offering specific scholarships to help cover significant — not all — portions of a child's tuition. More donors means potentially more money which in turn means more ability to help more families. Ultimately, this means greater enrollment, which means a football team, a larger ACADECA team, and more important to me than anything, it allows me to address teacher salaries at a level I need to.

I'm proud of the educational experience we offer here at CSF. I'm proud of the job our teachers do and the commitment our parents make to our schools and the education their child is afforded. It is my hope that we now educate the public as well.
